### General guidelines for entries on a works cited page.

The page itself has the words Works Cited centered at the top of the page. (Other formats like APA and Chicago Style use the words References or Bibliography.) In college, different classes will require different formats. For this paper, MLA (Modern Language Association) is appropriate and easiest.

Notice that the entries are arranged alphabetically by the author's last name or by the title of the article.

The second line of each individual entry is indented in what is called **hanging indentation**. It makes it easier for your reader to scan down the list to find the particular entry he or she is interested in.

The page is uniformly double spaced.

Each entry itself begins with the author's last name, then a comma, then the first name, then a period.

The title of an article has quotation marks around it. The period goes inside the quotation mark.

The title of a book or the name of a website is in *italics*. Underlining is not used any more. You do not need to include the www. nor do you need to include the entire URL.

For websites, look carefully to see if you can find who publishes the website and the date the article was posted or the last time the website was updated. Publishers in the above cited websites include The New York Times, The Garfield Messenger, and the University of Michigan. Put N.p. if you cannot find a publisher for the web site.

The n.d. in the "Zombies" entry means no date was found.

Identify the medium of the source. Print or Web are the most common, but one source is a personal interview.

The last date in each entry for electronic sources is the date you accessed the site. This is done because web or electronic material can change.
